



How to Change Your Conservator(s) or End Your Conservatorship

In Colorado, you have a right to a lawyer to help you change your conservator(s) or end your conservatorship. Below is a flow chart that moves through the legal process of how you can access a lawyer.

STEP 1:

Submit Legal Documents to the Court
Go to the next page for a checklist of the legal documents.



STEP 2:

Hearing on Giving Informed Consent
Before you can get a lawyer, the judge must make sure that you can give your informed consent to become a lawyer's client.

If the court decides:
Yes, You Can
Give Informed Consent

If the court decides:
No, You Cannot
Give Informed Consent

STEP 3:

You Can Get a Lawyer

- If you get Supplemental Security Income ("SSI") or Medicaid, the court will pay for your lawyer.
- If you do not get SSI or Medicaid, you will probably have to pay for the lawyer yourself.

STEP 3:

You Can Ask the Court to Give You a Guardian Ad Litem ("GAL") Instead

- The GAL can help you file an appeal to get a lawyer.
- The GAL can also talk to you about why you want to change your guardians or end your guardianship. The GAL will then share that information with the judge.

Checklist of legal documents that must be submitted to the court for **STEP 1**:

- JDF 888, Petition for Termination of Conservatorship:

 - Fill this form out and attach any additional information that helps explain to the court why you no longer need a conservator.
 - You must mail or hand-deliver a copy of JDF 888 Petition for Termination of Conservatorship (and attached information) to all interested persons in the case.
 - After mailing or hand-delivering a copy of JDF 888 Petition for Termination of Conservatorship, fill out the Certificate of Service part of the form.
- JDF 890 Order for Termination of Conservatorship:

 - Fill out the top "caption" part of this form and the court will fill out the rest.
- JDF 711 Notice of Hearing: <https://www.coloradojudicial.gov/self-help-and-forms/self-help-forms/notice-hearing-probate>
 - Give notice of the hearing date and time to all interested persons by mailing or hand-delivering a copy of this form. Fill out the Certificate of Service part of the form before you file it with the court.

Filing Steps:

- File JDF 888 and JDF 890 with the court.
- Contact the court about getting a date for a hearing.
- Give notice of the hearing to all interested parties. Fill the Certificate of Service portion of JDF 711 and file this form with the court too.
- There is no filing fee, and the form includes an option to request the appointment of an attorney or Guardian ad Litem (GAL).
